Jeffery C. Marshall & Monte Spencer The Herman Miller Mansion



Jeffrey Marshall and Monte Spencer have been dedicated owners and stewards of the Herman Miller Mansion since they purchased the home in 2013. Master builder, Herman Miller, took three years to build the home, finishing it in1928 for \$95,000, an astronomical sum in the 1920s. Miller also built the historic terracotta commercial building at Salem and Grand.

Daniel Grant Fitch House, built in 1856, is one of just a few examples of Greek Revival residential architecture in Dayton and one of the earliest homes on the west side. For several years, the home suffered from neglect for many years and at one point was at risk of demolition.

222 Dutoit is the location of the original farmhouse that was the first residence in the neighborhood that is now St. Anne's Hill. Adrienne Lee & Ryan Simon took on the project of protecting this very important landmark head-on through extensive renovations since they purchased it in 2019.

RESPONSIBILITIES

The Division of Housing Inspection is responsible for the enforcement of existing structural maintenance. This enforcement includes structural housing conditions (both interior and exterior), non-residential exterior enforcement, residential zoning, structural and public use nuisance and yard standards. We facilitate the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Dayton through the enforcement of property maintenance codes, education, and by bringing people and resources together.



Endangered Historic Properties—Traxler Mansion For nearly three years, PDI has worked to save this iconic home:



- proposed solutions to the owners' family and attorney
- offered to get estimates to stabilize the property to prevent further deterioration
- conducted a title search leading to the dismissal of an erroneous \$20K Federal lien
- offered to install a security system at PDI's expense
- repeatedly called housing officials and police to secure the home
- referred interested buyers to the owners' attorney
- worked with the City of Dayton, the Land Bank, and County officials to protect and find paths to revitalize the property


After the first fire, PDI

- Secured drone footage of the ruins (Thanks to Andy Rowe)
- Funded a LIDAR scan of the remaining structure
- Met with eight companies from SW Ohio and Indianapolis to get estimates to:
 - rebuild the exterior and "grey box" interior
 - stabilize the ruins for future reuse
 - or carefully demolish and salvage key features
- Researched numerous archives to find original architectural plans (Miami U, Dayton, Piqua and SUNY Cortland)
- Worked with JPA Architects who generously donated a REVIT model of the original structure based on the LIDAR scan

City OKs almost \$1 million for developer Simms' West Dayton townhome project

Money will pay for site preparation work on West Third Street in the Wright Dunbar district

- Total taxpayer support = \$1.3M (as of December 2022)
- Demolition cost = \$158.7k + \$150.7 = \$308.7 (City's original estimate = \$200k)
- \$980K City of Dayton Covid Relief Funds allocated for site preparation (engineering work, land planning, utilities): to make market-rate housing more affordable
- The Landmarks Commission denied the City's request to demolish the building (Sept. 2021) A Cincinnati developer:

- Projected that demolition costs would exceed \$200K
- Requested a \$450K incentive to stabilize the façade and redevelop the building
- Historic tax credits could have reduced development costs by 55% and leveraged public-private sector investment if the City had followed the Landmark Commission's decision to save the historic façade

Ways Vacant, Abandoned, and Deteriorated Properties Negatively Impact Communities



In Cleveland, Ohio, properties within 500 feet of a vacant, tax-delinquent, and foreclosed property lost 9.4% of their value.⁶

In 2016, the City of Toledo, Ohio, **spent \$3.8 million on services related to VAD properties**, including \$1 million on code enforcement, \$800,000 on nuisance abatement, \$600,000 on police dispatch, and \$1.4 million on fire dispatch.⁸

- Shift the burden of costs of vacant, blighted structures from the City and taxpayers to owners with code violations (e.g., boarding, mowing, legal costs, police, fire etc.)
- Impose fees and require reuse plans to motivate owners to bring properties back into use

Data and Analysis


While in comparison to other cities in Ohio, Dayton's is a very affordable city. The fact remains that many individuals are rent burdened paying more than 30% of their income for rent and many middle-income buyers are unable to find affordable housing to purchase.


